You May Need to Know...

Adopt a Fire Hydrant

In the event of a fire emergency, could firefighters find the hydrant near your home? We are encouraging residents to "adopt a fire hydrant" near their home and keep snow shoveled away and vegetation trimmed back. This will ensure hydrants are visible and will greatly speed the response time in case of an emergency. Time spent by firefighters searching for and clearing hydrants buried in drifts or plowed snow is precious time lost in saving a victims life or fighting a spreading fire. At minimum, fire hydrants need to have enough snow or vegetation cleared away to be visible from the street. The best option is to clear a 3 foot circle around the fire hydrant so firefighters have complete access in an emergency.



In addition don't forget to keep hydrants and fire lanes clear of vehicles at all times.

Marijuana Update

The Kalamazoo Township Board has made the decision to opt in for all 5 types of medical marijuana businesses. The planning commission is in the process of writing the zoning ordinance that will lay out the criteria for siting a business in the Township. At this time it looks like the facilities will be limited to commercial or industrial areas and require a 1,000 ft. buffer from schools and libraries and a 500 foot buffer from homes in residential areas. There will be a special meeting of the Planning Commission on January 18 and a public hearing is tentatively planned for February 8 prior to making a recommendation to the Board on February 12. A 2nd public hearing is tentatively scheduled for a special board meeting February 20, 2017. The Township will start taking applications on March 1.

Anyone opening a marijuana business will then have to go through the site plan review process like any other new business.

Clear Sidewalks Update

In a special edition of the newsletter we asked for your input on keeping sidewalks clear. For the last several years we had an ordinance requiring people to shovel sidewalks 500 ft. either side of a bus stop. This proved to be very impractical for the ordinance officer and people walking on the sidewalk. Based on the feedback we received, sidewalks are important to you. The board is looking at an amendment to get rid of the 500 ft. rule and require all sidewalks open to the public be kept clear. A copy of the proposed ordinance amendment will be posted on our website and you will have time to comment before it is passed by the board.

There were many people that thought it would be worthwhile for the Township to contract out the clearing of sidewalks along the busier streets such as W. Main which get even more than the usual amount of snow pushed onto the sidewalk by the plows. The Township will be looking into ways to equitably fund such a project.

In the meantime we want to make sure we practice what we preach. The Township Board has authorized the purchase of a compact tractor with a snow blower and blade so we can keep all the sidewalks on Township properties cleared in a timely manner.

We realize that not everyone has the ability to clear their sidewalks or pay to have them done. We are asking that neighborhood associations, churches and other service groups work together to address these needs. If the Township could have a list of contacts for shoveling we could share that information with those that need the help. We've been witnessing and hearing stories of neighbors helping neighbors and we want to let you know that we appreciate what you're doing. Great neighbors make a great neighborhood.

Fast Facts on Transportation Improvements

Thanks to a voter-approved bond millage from 2015 – 2017, 64.36 of Kalamazoo Township’s 75 miles of local roads were improved from 2015 – 2017, which involved 99,513 tons of hot mix asphalt (the equivalent weight of 443 Statue of Liberty National Monuments), 667,143 square yards of cold milling, 746 drainage spillways and 225 drainage structures!

Consistent with Kalamazoo Township’s Complete Streets policy, the bond also financed many non-motorized improvements, including over 44 “orphaned” sidewalks now connected to roadways with ADA-compliant ramps, 100 small repairs on high-use sidewalks, over 4 miles of signed bicycle routes, and 2.8 miles of new sidewalks adjacent to primary and other busy roads (including portions of Grand Prairie Road, Nazareth Road, Sunnyside Drive, Kendall Avenue, Olmstead



In 2018, the bond-funded, transportation projects will conclude with approximately one mile of road improvements on Dayton Street and Stewart Drive. In 2018 and thereafter, Kalamazoo Township will continue to invest in preventative maintenance measures to cost-effectively preserve the significant, bond-funded improvements.
